57/18 MATTERS ARISING

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Feedback to the Police

The Clerk had contacted PCSO Jo Addems with the Council's comments about lack of patrols and presence in the Parish. PCSO Addems responded to explain that the surgeries she had been holding were poorly attended and it was felt her time could be used more wisely; she is willing to start surgeries again, but a suitable venue would need to be found as she feels evenings and weekends may bring more people along – Woodland Way was suggested. She has been attending Pearce's with crime reduction advice and every shift a patrol car comes to the Parish – sometimes this is just a drive around due to lack of policing resources and this happens in other areas. The police prioritise areas where there are significant problems.

59/18 STANDING ITEM: CLERK'S INFORMATION

The Clerk reminded people that there is Code of Conduct training in Saltash on 26-03-18 and advised as many as possible to go — especially any new Councillors.

60/18 STANDING ITEM: CALSTOCK FLOOD DEFENCE – CONSULTATION REPORT CLLR TINTO AND JULIAN BROOKE-HOUGHTON, ENVIRONMENT AGENCY

Julian Brooke-Houghton was welcomed.

Cllr Tinto reminded people that a consultation had taken place looking at the Environment Agency's (EA) plans. This event was well received and well attended. Cllr Tinto had summarised the feedback into a report that had been disseminated. There was overwhelming support for the river walk and a fair amount of support for the creation of a new habitat (with some concerns raised about mosquitos and sewage). The Bike Show had support although it was not universal.

Proposal: The Parish Council accepts Cllr Tinto's report and circulates it more widely to the public (proposed: Cllr Tinto; seconded: Cllr Wilkes)

Resolution: unanimous support.

Cllr Tinto continued to say that Sheryll Murray had become involved and had attended a second meeting with Cllr Kirk, representatives from the Bike show and parishioners. The Environment Agency were able to explain some changes to the original proposal which were not available on the consultation day. Cllr Tinto feels that this does show that they have been taking on board comments that they have been getting.

Julian Brooke-Houghton explained that the revised plans could not be shared at the consultation day become they involved individual properties and the agency wanted to ensure they had spoken to each individual householder. The new plans would protect the field used by the bike show with only a loss of a small corner.

The riverbank and path were discussed as this is a source of concern for the many who use it. It would not seem that a 'bridge' will be a feasible option but a boardwalk has been suggested. Some money (£40,000) may be forthcoming to be put towards the cost of this but it is unlikely that the Environment Agency will be able to build it and certainly not maintain it; they will be looking to pass the ownership and management of the path onto either the Parish Council or Cornwall Council. Julian said that Cllr Kirk had stated that she would try to ensure Cornwall Council make this permissive path a definitive right of way.

The Environment Agency are hoping to have talks with agencies such as the AONB, Cornwall Wildlife Trust, RSPB about the future management of the habitat; maintaining a nature reserve is not something the EA will undertake. But the creation of a habitat enables funding to be sought.

Cllr Riggs asked whether the amended plans would be available to be publicly viewed but they are not ready yet. Cllr Greenwood raised concern about having to transport materials in if the quality of the existing material is not good enough to build a new bank. Cllr Letchford asked about the liability of the bund if it were to fall down.

The Clerk reminded the Parish Councillors that the Parish Council's precept is £160,000 which has to pay for all work across the whole parish which does not indicate much could be committed to one particular project.

Cllr Tinto rounding the discussion off and acknowledged that there are still a lot of uncertainties and concerns. He thanked Julian for attending.

Proposal/Resolution: The Parish Council continue to work with the Environment Agency, Sheryll Murray MP, and other interested parties to support the general direction the EA is taking, especially as current plans are closer to what the majority of the public wanted (proposed: Cllr Tinto, seconded: Cllr Wilkes; support with one abstention).

74/18 IT/GDPR – CLERK AND CLLR LATHAM

The Data Protection Act is being updated and coming into force in May. This will have a huge impact on the IT systems and processes. With regret, it was mutually agreed between the Clerk and Dick Hoile that in view of the extra amount of work that would need to be undertaken to adhere to new procedures a new company is sought. The Clerk has taken advice from other Parish Council who have recommend a company in Truro.

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75/18 <u>CONDUCT AND FILMING DURING MEETINGS –</u> RECOMMENDATION/ADVICE FROM CALC

Cllr Tinto explained that filming had come up as a subject when looking at the policy on Social Media. The Public and Press have a right to film meetings without seeking permission. CALC produced guidelines which raised questions such as should the Parish Council film meetings? How do we notify people that they may be filmed? How do we provide a 'safe space' for those not wishing to be filed etc.

Proposal/Resolution: The Personnel Committee draw up some recommendations from the NALC guidelines and report back to full council (proposed: Cllr Tinto; seconded: Cllr Woolford; unanimous support).
