

Rebecca Nesbit & Phil Gould at Coombeside, Harrowbarrow, who sent the following piece on one of their passions:

"For those who pass through northern Harrowbarrow, you may have noticed some changes at Coombeside (the cream house next to where the MG garage used to be). The for-sale sign has gone, as has the buddleia growing out of the chimney and the dandelions claiming the driveway. If you pass by at night, you may also have noticed a bright light glowing in the garden. This doesn't herald an alien landing, but the arrival of two entomologists: me and my husband Phil. The light is our moth trap, and we have been thrilled with what it has caught.

We've run the trap just five times since we arrived in June, and have identified 198 species of moth. These range from stunning pink and green Elephant Hawkmoths, with wingspans of up to 6cm, to micromoths such as Phyllonorycter maestingella. These are just 4mm long and stunningly patterned with gold and white bands. One highlight has been the Jersey Mocha. The first UK records of this European moth came from the Channel Islands, and then it was first seen in mainland Britain in 2003. It has since spread in the south west and is breeding locally.

We've also been very pleased to catch many Dusky Thorns. When Phil was collecting data for a State of Britain's Larger Moths report in 2013, this species was found to be in the top ten of the UK's most declining moths. However, they seem to be doing pleasingly well around Harrowbarrow.



Other moths have been highlights for me because of their beauty: Maiden's Blush, Rosy Tiger, Frosted Orange, Black Arches, Angle Shades and Small Elephant Hawkmoth, to name just a few. It isn't only moths we have been catching. We've had

multiple species of wasp, beetle, shield bug and caddisfly, for example. Of particular note were two pseudoscorpions, related to spiders and, unlike scorpions, only a few millimetres long with no sting. They are known for using insects for transport, and these two were hitching a lift on a crane fly (daddy long legs), clinging to its legs with pincers that resemble those of scorpions. Phil took pictures down the microscope and shared them on Twitter – if you would like to see these or any moth photos, you can search online for **@PhilipJLGould or @RebeccaNesbit** (you'll be able to do this even if you're not on Twitter). Moths are just one part of what we have enjoyed about Harrowbarrow – we have also appreciated the warm welcome, and look forward to meeting many more people."



News of the New Burial Grounds Project

from Rev. Christopher Painter Rector, Tamar Valley Benefice Family history research is now big business and a hugely popular hobby, drawing people from all over the world to seek out old records and graves. A new, free *Burial Grounds Project* by the Church of England 15 nationally will see every churchyard in the Diocese of Truro digitally mapped, along with the digitization of parish records, meaning parishes and public will now be able to view the information easily. The Bishop of Truro the Rt. Revd Philip Mounstephen said, "Having laboriously traced my own family tree in the old Cornwall Council records office many years ago, I know what a valuable resource this digital tool will be for many people researching their own genealogy. It's also a way of making our churches more 'porous' and welcoming to visitors: I'm very much in favour of anything that helps us do that, so I commend this project wholeheartedly."

The project is free to parishes with the work done by a team from Atlantic Geomatics, the company hired by the Church of England nationally. They will visit the churchyard and church to effect the mapping and digitizing of the parish records. The digital records and images will then be integrated with the Church Heritage Record, the national database of the Church of England, to which the diocese has access.

A simplified version of the digital map and images of the records created will be safely and permanently curated and will be freely available for the public to view. Other more complex functionality, such as managing the map and searching across the national database, will be available on payment of a subscription.



Calstock Parish Council Round Up A council meeting was held on 10 August. Following advice from Cornwall Council it was felt that we should continue to hold large meetings in Harrowbarrow Village Hall where we can maintain social distance.

Last year we were overwhelmed with offers of help with our Covid-19 Volunteer Scheme. We decided to continue offering

a low-level service for people who temporarily find they are unable to go shopping, collect prescriptions, walk their dog or need help getting to medical appointments. We will ask volunteers to have a DBS check and if you are interested in helping (or have offered previously and wish to continue) do get in contact with us. Please do let us know if you require any help (it does not have to be Covid related).

At its last meeting the Parish Council supported the CEE Bill (Climate and Ecological Emergency Bill) in an effort to reverse the climate & ecological breakdown we are facing. The Parish Council feels the UK needs to take responsibility for its fair share of greenhouse gas emissions, actively to



restore biodiverse habitats and stop damaging our natural world through the production, transportation and disposal of goods we consume. A letter from our MP Sheryll Murray acknowledged our support and we hope that she too will support the Private Members Bill when it is motioned in

Parliament. If you would like to find out more about the Bill and see how you can support visit: https://www.ceebill.uk/bill Our project to help with the climate emergency is our Forest for Calstock Parish Committee which continues to put in bids for trees and has ordered a mixture for Calstock and St Ann's Playing Fields and Albaston's Millennium Green. We hope to plant during National Tree Week at the end of November. If you can offer help in planting and looking after the trees, we would love to have your details. We will be sharing management plans/planting schemes on our website shortly.

Our Delaware Ward Members and our County Councillor have been working on road safety issues along the A390. Funding has been secured from the Caradon Community Network Panel for some mobile speed cameras and a community Speed-Watch group is likely to be set up soon. We will also contact Devon Highways about Gunnislake Newbridge which is very untidy and overgrown. We want people to have a good first impression not just of our parish but of Cornwall as a whole. Please remember that our councillors are unpaid volunteers who

represent the views of local people and do so within a democratic process. Not every collective council decision will be popular but no councillor should receive personal attack or defamation of character. We thank our councillors for the work they do and wish those who are at present experiencing ill health all the best for their recovery.

In January this year the Parish Council published their decision to have all plastic removed from the graveyards. This decision was taken in line with Environmental and Climate concerns and unanimously approved by the Parish Council on 14 July 2020. The local press was informed and there have been several articles in the local newspapers. Signs were put up in the cemeteries and on our website, and local Facebook pages have also broadcast this. When we visited the cemetery in August intending to clear plastic items, we encountered some opposition. On the whole, when we explained why we were doing this, people supported the initiative, and we were pleased to meet people face-to-face to discuss the issue. People are under the misapprehension that when they purchase a burial plot they are buying the plot of land. What people are doing is buying an Exclusive Right which entitles a burial in the plot for 99 years. Our



cemetery regulations still need to be adhered to. Cemeteries all have different regulations – some only allow a headstone and no flowers, some do not allow black granite whilst the Diocese of Truro does not allow any artificial flowers in their churchyards. As a council we are entitled to change our regulations – this decision was not taken lightly but it is in

direct response to the plastics crisis which is causing destruction to the wildlife and landscape. Snowdrops, hellebores, bluebells, primulas, geraniums, daffodils, pansies, and begonias are all seasonal plants that add colour all year round and can be planted in terracotta tubs or directly in the ground as an alternative to artificial flowers.

Silk flowers on metal stems will be allowed provided there are no plastic pieces as these end up causing the most damage. We took on board people's comments that they wanted to be the ones to remove the artificial flowers and ornaments and we have left them on the graves. But our initiative remains and we will revisit the cemetery at the end of September to clear any remaining plastic.

We thank the members of the public who turned up to help tidy up the cemetery: a whole dumpy bag was filled with general litter.

Her wide contribution to many aspects of village life is eloquently remembered elsewhere in Hamlet, but with respect to the Village Show Helen was the quiet, always dependable, unflappable secretary for many years. Happy autumn everyone! As I write this, all of a sudden summer has gone - so hello autumn, a special time of the year with birds relatively quiet as no more courtship is required and the annual moult is in progress when new feathers replace the old. Do not worry if you see a bird that does not look too good: they have been busy feeding their young and are absolutely shattered to-ing and fro-ing with nutritious caterpillars, though most young have now fledged and can catch their own meals. The birds will

soon start looking their resplendent selves again This summer's highlight has been watching and hearing Ravens flying and conducting acrobatics overhead. I have never heard or seen them in this area before although there have been past reports of them at Cotehele.

I hope they delight us with their presence for many more years. Please keep topping up your feeders. There is an abundance of food for the birds with berries etc. in the hedgerows and fields and you may find your feeders to be quiet but there are a number of birds that continue to rely on what you put out.

Jobs for now: clean out any bird boxes of old nests to encourage blue tits and the like to roost inside them during the winter and, if you are lucky, up to fifty or more Wrens.

Happy bird watching and remember we share the village with lots of wildlife so kill your speed and not anything else.

Butterfly Diary *by Jean Miller* The season started slowly and during the Butterfly Count there was not a huge showing in my garden in Harrowbarrow. What follows is the diary of my time set aside with a cup of coffee to do the counts.

17/07: 2 Large Whites & a Speckled Wood.

18/07 : During my visit with a friend to a CWT garden, The Lodge at Fletcher's Bridge. 1 Small Copper, 1 Gatekeeper, 2 Small & 2 Large Whites & 3 Fritillaries dancing across one of the lakes looked like Silver Washed Fritillaries (bright orange with silver streaks underneath). I entered them into iRecordButterflies along with a Wall Brown (the first I'd seen in years) on the 2nd August as they were not part of the common butterflies & moths that you can register.

19/08 : Back home, 1 Red Admiral, 2 Large Whites, 1 Gatekeeper. 20/07 : 1 Red Admiral, 2 large whites & the first Ringlet of the year fluttering over our meadow.

22/07 : 2 Large & 2 Small Whites.

23/07 : 1 Red Admiral, 2 Large Whites & 1 Gatekeeper.

24/07 : A Silver Y moth was resting on the bathroom wall. 2 large Whites & 2 Red Admirals were getting heady on nectar from buddleia flowers. 25/07 : We celebrated grandson Theo's 3rd birthday with a picnic on the terrace. 2 Gatekeepers, 3 Large Whites, 1 Small White, 1 Red Admiral & a Comma joined the party.

27/07 : 1 Common Blue, 1 Comma, 1 Small White, 1 Small Copper & 1 Red Admiral.

28/07 : 1 Meadow Brown in the meadow, 2 Large Whites, 1 Small White & 1 Red Admiral.

29/07 : 2 Meadow Browns at the Walkers & Talkers lunch over at St Elizabeth House, Plympton (can highly recommend!).

30/07 : Back home, just 1 Red Admiral & 1 Small White.

01/08:3 small Whites, 1 Green Veined, 1 Peacock & 1 Comma.

I was so pleased to see so many more Peacocks after the Count had finished, along with some wonderful Brimstones and more Green Veined butterflies. I Hope you have enjoyed this year's Butterfly Diary! **J M**



Summer Weather in Sunny Harrowbarrow ! Chris Miller on the last 3 months at Sunnyridge Weather Station

June: Strongest wind recorded - 14 mph from the SE on 01 June.

Temperature - Highest 26° C on 30 June. Lowest 6° C on 04 June.

(Highest recorded in last 5 years $31 \degree C$ on 25 June 2020)

Rainfall for June was 5.07"

July: Strongest wind recorded - 19 mph from the SW on 30 June. Temperature - Highest 32 ° C on 21 July of. Lowest 10 ° C on 06 July. (Highest recorded in last 5 years was this year) Rainfall for July was 6.85"

August: Strongest wind recorded - 13 mph from SSE on 05 August. Temperature - Highest 25 ° C on 24 August. Lowest 9 °C on 02 August. (The record was 31 °C on 12 August 2020) Total rainfall for August was 4.41″
