
#### A Spring Concert by Calstock Singers

I don't know about the rest of the readers, but the month of January, now I am retired, does not seem as long as it did when I was working. #### Calstock Parish Council Update



Calstock Parish Council have objected to Cornwall Council's Devolution Deal as they feel the funding offered is inadequate and any powers and benefits the deal outlines should stay with Cornwall Council whose elected officers will have less influence under the deal suggested.

We are delighted to report that installation is under way for speed cameras on the A390, thanks to Delaware Ward Members and councillor Dorothy Kirk. A crossing is still being negotiated and there will also be an extension to the 30mph limit from Blades Salon to the

tarmacked footpath by the road at Edgecombe Way. We think these improvements will benefit many people in the Parish.

We are interested to know of any plans your community has for the King's Coronation.

In May we will announce this year's Citizen Of The Year. If you would like to nominate an unpaid hero please let us know before 31 March 2023 (we realise you may be reading this after this date so watch this space to see who received it).

In wider news, Calstock Car Park will be having some work done on the fluvial drains which we hope will help with the issues of flooding and we continue to press for information on spills into the River Tamar in order to campaign for a cleaner river.

#### News from Calstock Parish Archive - Lynda Harman

In January we were pleased to welcome twenty very happy pupils from Calstock school who visited the archive to find some differences between their school now and as it used to be. One of the volunteers had attended the school and was as surprised as the children were at some of the changes. The archive holds various information, including interviews from past pupils both at Calstock school, and Churchtown, now closed of course. The children enjoyed photographs of pupils in the past, and found it interesting that they had no uniforms. We hope to see them again.

The archive was also involved with the project involving the Parish Council and Gunnislake and Delaware schools. The children will be helping maintain some of the graves in Albaston cemetery for people who are unable to maintain family graves themselves. Part of the project is to find out more about the people buried there.

Though closed during January due to the cold and cost of heating, we are open again. Last year we were fortunate to receive funding from Councillor Dorothy Kirk's community fund and from the Calstock Parish Local History Group to install secondary glazing on three windows of the cemetery chapel. This has now been done. In January we learned that we had been successful in our bid to the Cornwall Community Foundation to install secondary glazing on the other five windows.

We are finding it increasingly difficult to keep the archive open to the public because we need more volunteers. If you think you might be

interested, please contact me or just pop in during one of the sessions to see what we get up to. You might like to browse photographs whilst you are there. Tamar Valley Health Update from the TVH Patient Participation group A year ago was the Omicron shut down yet there have been several fantastic achievements by the new primary care network. These include 10,500 COVID vaccinations via the Spring and Winter programmes, 7,500 flu vaccines; restarting the chronic disease reviews; and the advent of more clinical and non-clinical roles in support of patient care. Saturday clinics have been expanded with a new service 'Enhanced Access' to help meet Tamar Valley Health's mission to support healthier lives.

NHS Digital published figures for October 2022 showing that Tamar Valley Health completed 12,161 face-to-face patient appointments. TVH is the 9th biggest practice in the County but that month were ranked 3rd for appointments, a huge achievement considering the challenges the practice faced. The practice continues to invest in both Gunnislake and Callington sites to improve the experience of staff and service users, including expanding the clinical space they have to see patients.

What is affecting the TVH practice over winter is the massive increase in patient demand due to RSV, flu and cold viruses. If you are at high risk and have not already done so, please consider booking a flu vaccination. Contact the practice on 01579 382666 to book your appointment.

Did you receive the AFP - Alternative Fuels Payment?

If you use alternative fuels for heating you may be eligible for a £200

Alternative Fuels Payment (AFP) if both the following are true:

your household is not connected to the mains gas grid;

you use alternative fuels as your main form of heating.

(This is on top of the £400 from your electricity supplier.)

You're eligible for this payment if the main way you heat your home uses tank or bottled gas, liquid petroleum gas (LPG), oil, wood, or solid fuel.

Most homes eligible will get it automatically as a credit on their electricity bills from February 2023. If you're not sure, check. If you didn't receive it, contact your electricity supplier, or search for Alternative Fuels Payment on gov.uk and apply online.

#### Gorgeous Galanthus by Virginia Spiers

In early Spring my favourite gardening job is always splitting and spreading the snowdrops.

In our garden and steep patch of former market garden with rows of old fashioned daffodils, there were very few snowdrops when we moved here almost 50 years ago - just a few dainty late flowerers in a hedge. I was given clumps and buckets of different varieties by friends and relatives from old orchards and overgrown gardens - tall early singles, shorter ones, several doubles and a few more unusual varieties from specialist gardeners.

As soon as the flowers faded I used to split impacted clumps and spread them to different areas. Now they whiten hedge-banks, form drifts under the shrubs and brighten undergrowth in the regenerating woodland.

#### Church News

from Rev. Chris (Rector) (Harrowbarrow 2023)

I don't know how many of you have read, or are even aware of, the deanery plan. As our churches struggle with dwindling numbers (covid made a significant impact) and our income is reduced, we struggle. We struggle to keep church life going and we therefore are unable to support the 5 stipendiary clergy we have. The deanery

(parishes between, and including, Callington and Torpoint) will be cared for by just 3 clergy. The parishes are therefore being gathered into three groups with Calstock, St Dominick and St Mellion with Pillaton joining with the four parishes of the Callington cluster under one priest, whilst Landulph will be joined with Saltash Area Ministry. There is a lot more than this to the plan and I hope you will continue to support your parish church, whoever is providing pastoral care. It will continue with worship, mission and ministry.

You may have heard that I am leaving the parishes at Easter. I invite anyone who'd like to say goodbye (or ensure that I go!) to join me for a buffet lunch at St Dominic village Hall at 12.00 on Palm Sunday (2 April). Come to the 10am walk or 10.40 service at St Dominic if you can. The pattern of worship on Sundays will continue. Please contact Wardens for details, and send an email (we'll tell you where presently) for baptisms, weddings and funerals.

A reminder to you for your diaries. We continue to worship at All Saints on the first and third Sundays every month. For Holy week and Easter - On Palm Sunday (2 April) (as in past years) we walk through St Dominic stopping at places to have a dramatic reading of the Easter story. Maundy Thursday remembers the Jewish Passover, with the Last Supper and the Watch of the Passion. Holy Saturday (before Easter Day) sees a dramatic service of 'Easter Fire'. In the darkness we hear God's promise of rescue, there is fire and candlelight and Easter is proclaimed in a blaze of light and glory. On Easter Sunday, the first light of Easter Day at sunrise heralds the Resurrection as we gather at Halton Quay for worship at 6.35 (giving you a 25 minute lie-in over last year!) Several churches in the benefice will hold a service on Easter Day, and we will continue to celebrate the Resurrection.

Above all, we are a people of hope, and we seek to service our community by being a beacon of light and new life for all.
